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
Dancing On the Edge

V ery few people understand the ends and outs of the Federal budget process. We don't include ourselves in this group so we won't venture very deeply into the potential impacts of the Sequester which seems likely to go into effect on Friday. There are so many tricks that can be done with the budget that speculation at this stage is a waste of time.

One thing that seems more certain is that if you are a person who likes government to be in a perpetual state of crisis, them this is your moment. Consider:

The sequester comes into force this Friday. What will its impact be?

- The Executive Branch has yet to submit its FY14 budget to Congress although it was supposed to do so in early February. Will it make its next announced deadline of submitting a budget by Monday, March 4th?
- 2 If that isn't enough then consider that the Continuing Resolution that has been keeping the government open since October 1 expires on March 27. Congress is scheduled to begin their two week Spring recess on March 22 so that gives them three weeks from Friday to work out spending for the remaining six months of the fiscal year.
- Want more? At some point as early as May the US will approach its debt limit once again which will require Congressional authorization to do so. This issue will be played out against the backdrop of sequestration and FY13/14 spending.
