





Navajo Settlement

Settles claims of the Navajo Nation in the San Juan Basin, New Mexico

> Taos Settlement

Settles claims of the Pueblo of Taos in the Rio Pueblo de Taos and Rio Hondo stream systems


> Aamodt Settlement

Settles claims of the Pueblos of Nambe, Pojoaque, San Ildefonso and Tesuque in the Nambé-Pojoaque-Tesuque Basin



A long journey

- Disputes over land title
 - Treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo -1848
 - U.S. v. Joseph (1876)
 - Pueblo Lands Act of 1924
 - Pueblo water rights
 - Aamodt case filed 1966
 - Water Rights Spanish and Mexican law
 - Priority Time Immemorial



Litigation vs. Settlement

Litigation claims exceed water supply

- ► even exercise of Historically Irrigated Acreage (HIA) rights would threaten senior Acequia diversions.
- ► litigation would challenge groundwater depletions.

Settlement

- seeks to protect status quo.
- make pie bigger with imported supply.
- reature of compromise.

Northwestern New Mexico Rural Water Projects Act, Title X, Subtitle B of the Omnibus Public Land Management Act of 2009, Public Law 111-11, March 30, 2009

> Taos Settlement

Claims Resolution Act of 2010, Title VI, Public Law 111-291, December 8, 2010

> Aamodt Settlement

Claims Resolution Act of 2010, Title V, Public Law 111-291, December 8, 2010





Signed Dec. 8, 2010

Signed March 14, 2013.



What does the Settlement do?

- Authorized acquisition of water rights
- Construction of regional water system
 - Appropriated: \$56.5 M
 - Authorized: \$50.0 M

\$106.5 M (index 2006)

Resolves long-standing water disputes

Terms of Settlement

- Pueblos give up claims to expanding water rights
- Agree to limit priority calls
- Regional water system serving both Pueblo and non-Pueblo residents:
 - >2,500 acre-feet for Pueblos
 - > up to 1,500 acre-feet for Non-Pueblos
 - Reduces impacts on aquifer and surface flows
